

District Budget 2018-2019



During the process of building the 2018-2019 school district budget four goals were established. We developed a fiscally responsible budget producing a tax levy under the state's mandated 2% hard cap that meets the needs of all stakeholders while delivering creative educational experiences for the students, increases the District's commitment to their staff in that teachers are properly trained to deliver up to date curriculum for the students, continues the District's technology plan to ensure its effective use in the classroom to increase student achievement, and includes realistic multi-year maintenance and capital budgets. We are very proud of this budget in that it addresses and continues the ultimate goal--preparing our students for the future.




Oradell Solar Update
